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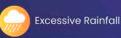

My warmest greetings to all the member-owners of Oro Integrated Cooperative as we celebrate our 59th Annual General Assembly with the theme: "OIC: Contributing to Building a Better World." I would also like to extend my heartfelt wishes to all Ka-OICs for a Happy International Year of Cooperatives!

As we approach our 60th anniversary, it is an opportune time to reflect on OIC's progress and the challenges we have overcome throughout the years. Today, we proudly stand with \$12.78 billion in total assets and a membership base of 195,600 across 23 branches.

Our journey began on March 5, 1966, when Oro Cooperative Credit Union was established by 28 pioneering members, inspired by the Rochdale Pioneers of England, who laid the foundation for cooperative principles.

A strong pillar of OIC's success has been its intensive education program. In the early years, the Pre-Membership Education Seminar, conducted over six weekends, ensured that prospective members fully understood the philosophy, values, and principles of cooperativism.

Over our 59-year journey as a vehicle for members to achieve their financial aspirations, we have experienced both triumphs and trials.

During OIC's second decade, we faced operational challenges, particularly in profitability and liquidity. However, through the perseverance of our officers and management, along with unwavering support from our members, we remained steadfast in fulfilling our mission. It was during these difficult times that our members demonstrated the true essence of cooperation, proving that through the cooperative, they could uplift one another.

In the early 1990s, members made a pivotal decision: instead of receiving cash dividends, they opted for stock dividends, which enabled the construction of OIC's first member-owned building—housing the Head Office and the Yacapin Branch. Additionally, during this period, OIC transitioned to a computerized accounting system, ensuring the timely and reliable production of financial statements and aging reports.

In adherence to financial standards, the General Assembly approved the full provisioning of delinquent accounts, which initially resulted in lower dividend and patronage refund rates. Despite this personal sacrifice, members prioritized the long-term financial stability of OIC. Since then, we have remained fully compliant with standard provisioning requirements.



The hard work of our staff and officers, combined with the cooperation and dedication of our members, bore fruit when OIC was honored with the Bronze ACCESS Award (A-One Competitive Choice for Excellence in Service and Soundness) by the Asian Confederation of Credit Unions in 2022.

As one of the country's billionaire cooperative, committed to upholding financial standards, OIC is now focused on enhancing member education and engagement, strengthening organizational capacity, and improving business processes and service delivery.

The success of our mission and brand promise depends on the solidarity of our stakeholders and their unwavering commitment to fulfilling their responsibilities.

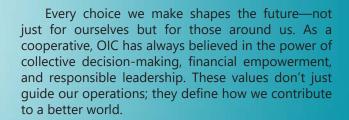

Healthy Women, Stronger Communities: OlC's Breast & Cervical Awareness & Free Screening Program

On March 8, 2024, Oro Integrated Cooperative (OIC) launched its Breast & Cervical Awareness and Free Screening Program under the leadership of Dir. Hermes G. Vergara, Chairperson of the GAD Committee, at Grand Caprice Restaurant, Limketkai Center. In partnership with Physicians-Nurses Foundation Inc. (MOPNFI) and JR Borja General Hospital, the initiative gathered 189 attendees, including 9 males and 180 females.

This program takes a vital step in the early detection and prevention of breast and cervical cancer, two of the most prevalent illnesses affecting women worldwide. Free screenings were provided to female members, with mammography and pap smear tests covered for those requiring further evaluation.

to women's health, empowerment, and preventive care. Early detection is crucial in improving survival rates and treatment outcomes, ensuring that more women have access to lifesaving healthcare services.

Beyond screening, the program emphasizes education on routine check-ups, self-examinations, and preventive measures, equipping women with knowledge and resources to take charge of their health.

By December 2024, 76 members had availed of this lifesaving program.

he Lakbay Aral study visit is a transformative learning experience for OIC employees, offering firsthand exposure to cooperative best practices. From October 25 to November 24, 2024, employees from Cogon, Balingasag, Yacapin, Tagbilaran, El Salvador, Talakag, and the Head Office explored how successful cooperatives implement business development services (BDS), financial models, and member engagement strategies to empower micro-entrepreneurs.

One key takeaway was the value of structured support systems, where cooperative personnel actively monitor members' business progress, ensuring targeted interventions. Employees also saw the impact of designated trading areas, which provide cooperative members with market access and economic opportunities beyond financial assistance.

The visit also introduced microlending innovations, such as inkind loans, where funds are directly converted into business resources instead of cash, reducing financial risks and ensuring productive investments. These strategies inspire OIC to enhance its financial

assistance programs and remove traditional collateral barriers, making funding more accessible to microentrepreneurs.

For Chine Mae Aldia from the Head Office, the experience reinforced the importance of holistic member support. "Seeing how other cooperatives go beyond financial aid offering mentorship, training, and market access, gives us fresh ideas to improve OIC's programs."

Beyond member services, the visit highlighted employee engagement and welfare programs, including housing assistance, performancebased bonuses, education subsidies, and organized records management systems. Environmental sustainability was another focus, with waste disposal initiatives and 5S workplace organization programs promoting efficiency across branches.

For Riche Ann Lobino from the Yacapin Branch, the experience was invaluable. "Seeing firsthand how other cooperatives implement their programs gave us new perspectives and ideas on how we can further assist our members in their business endeavors. The visit reinforced the importance of providing financial assistance, market opportunities, and continuous mentoring to ensure sustainable growth."

Navigating the Early Stages of Risk Management in Oro Integrated Cooperative

Embarking on the journey of risk management has been a game-changer for us at Oro Integrated Cooperative. Looking back at the initial phase, we see more than just policies and processes—we see a real shift in mindset—one that prioritizes stability, accountability, and proactive decision-making. This milestone signals our commitment to protecting our members' trust and securing our cooperative's future.

Workshops: Laying the Groundwork for Risk Awareness

A key moment in this journey was the Risk Management Workshop, held from August 12 to 16, 2024. Bringing together our department unit heads and members of the Risk Management Committee, the workshop was facilitated by our trusted partners at NATCCO. It was an eye-opening experience—one where we identified risks we hadn't considered before and gained the confidence to tackle challenges head-on.

Through interactive sessions, participants gained insights into potential threats that could affect the cooperative's operations. The discussions emphasized the importance of recognizing strategic, financial, operational, regulatory, reputational, and environmental risks, ensuring that risk management becomes a shared responsibility across all levels.

The Risk Register: Our Guide to Smarter Decision-Making

One of the key outputs of this initiative was the development of the Risk Register. This document serves as a centralized record of identified risks, their likelihood and impact, and the necessary controls to mitigate them. The Risk Register acts as a roadmap, helping the cooperative prioritize risk responses while ensuring compliance with regulatory requirements.

Having a Risk Register means:

- We can spot potential problems early and act before they escalate.
- Our leaders can make informed decisions, backed by data.
- We strengthen compliance and accountability, ensuring we always act in the best interest of our members.

More than just a document, our Risk Register has become a daily tool for better governance.

Risk-Based Auditing: Strengthening Compliance and Accountability



Another major shift currently underway is the implementation of the Risk-Based Audit Approach. To complement the risk management framework, OIC has embraced this methodology, which aligns internal audits with the cooperative's key risk areas, ensuring that resources are allocated efficiently to high-risk operations. By shifting from traditional compliance-focused audits to risk-driven evaluations, the cooperative enhances its ability to detect vulnerabilities before they become critical.

With Risk-Based Auditing, we:

- Keep a closer eye on high-risk areas.
- Continuously improve internal controls and accountability.
- Ensure our cooperative remains resilient and ready for any challenge.

The Road Ahead: Building a Risk-Aware Culture

As of this year, Oro Integrated Cooperative is in the first phase of implementing Enterprise Risk Management (ERM). This marks a strategic effort to integrate risk considerations into decision-making processes at all levels. ERM fosters a culture where risk awareness is ingrained in day-to-day operations, giving our members confidence that management is committed to a compliant and sustainable future.

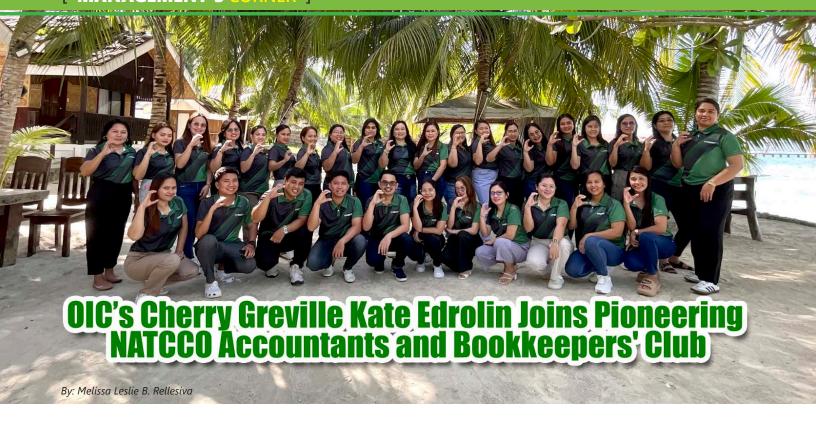
As we move forward, we're committed to:

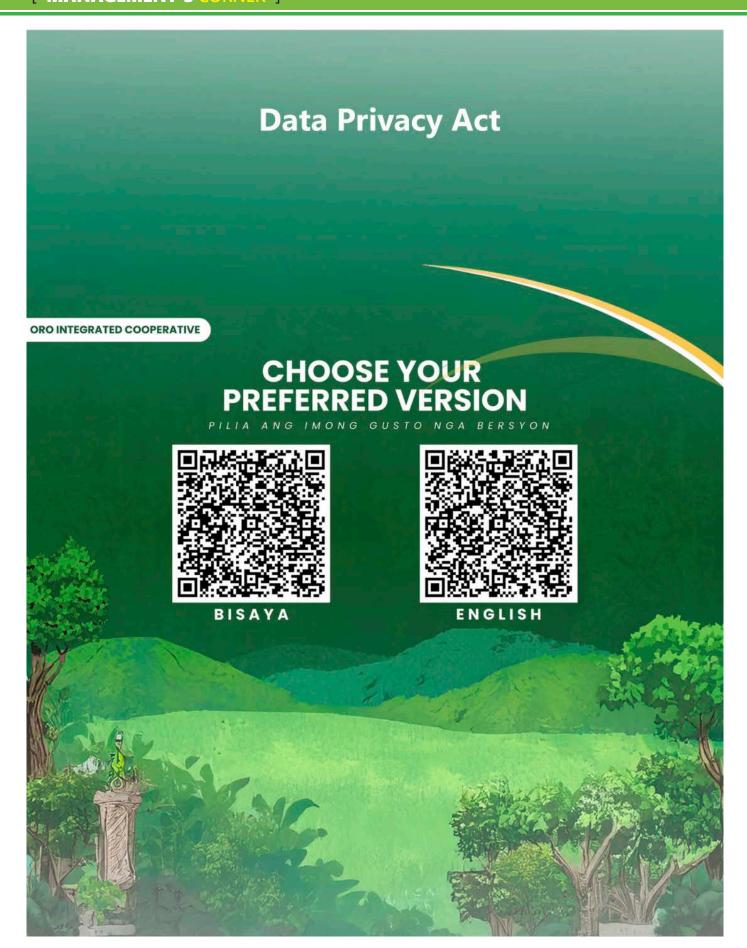

Leading with Purpose: Conversations with OIC's New Branch Managers

Stepping into leadership is not just about managing operations—it's about inspiring change, fostering growth, and building a future where financial empowerment is within reach for all. For Oro Integrated Cooperative's (OIC) newest Branch Managers, this transition marks both a personal achievement and a renewed commitment to the cooperative's mission of service, innovation, and community development.

A Journey Shaped by Experience and Purpose

Norwin Matanog Migallon (El Salvador), Rafael "Paeng" T. Felisilda (Gingoog), and Rolando "Boyax" L. Roa (Bayugan) each took different paths to leadership, but they share the same passion—to uplift lives through cooperation.

Norwin's journey began far from leadership. "I was once a laborer and factory worker. Life was tough, but OIC showed me how cooperatives change lives. That's when I knew I wanted to be part of something bigger."

Paeng initially had doubts about cooperatives.
"To be honest, I didn't like them at first," he admitted.
"But when I saw OIC helping members regain stability, my perspective changed. I realized I wanted to lead, not just follow."

Boyax, a former student assistant, worked his way through college. "That experience taught me discipline and resilience—qualities I bring into my leadership at OIC."

Now an integral part of the Compliance Department at OIC, Ms. Escolania continues to make meaningful contributions. Her knowledge, skills, and commitment

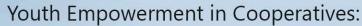


to regulatory compliance played a crucial role in the development of the Data Privacy Act Self-Paced Learning Module and Material.

Fire Brigade Volunteers: An Inside Look

Disaster resilience is at the heart of the OIC Fire Brigade Volunteer program. Through proactive fire prevention, awareness campaigns, and specialized training, the initiative reduces risks, enhances community preparedness, and aligns with SDG 13 (Climate Action) to support climate change mitigation and adaptation. By fostering a culture of safety, the program ensures a more resilient environment against fire-related disasters.

Among the dedicated volunteers are Mr. Jairus A. Bagnol and Mr. Ruben P. Cainglet Jr., who share their experiences in fire prevention and disaster response.

A Lifelong Dream Realized

"Joining the OIC fire volunteer training was a dream come true," shared Jairus Bagnol in an interview for Tara na Mag. "Mr. Mike Tabaco from the OIC Puerto branch offered me the opportunity, and I eagerly accepted."

The five-day intensive training covered fire and rescue techniques, medical training, and practical drills at Pelaez Sports Center, including rope rescue and fire hose handling. Operating in full PPE was particularly challenging, but continuous learning helped volunteers enhance their skills.

"One of the most defining moments of my journey was when my own house caught fire. Thanks to my training, I stayed calm and quickly extinguished the flames, preventing further damage. Another critical moment was responding to an LPG store fire in Agusan. I was first on the scene, assisting despite the risks. We always prioritize safety and closely coordinate with the BFP for efficient emergency response."

Challenges such as responding without direct supervision require volunteers to make quick decisions. "There was even a time I had to

climb a roof without proper equipment, but thanks to OIC, we were later provided with essential rescue gear."

Beyond fire response, volunteers assist with water rationing in communities like Regency Iponan, ensuring access to essential resources. "Seeing the gratitude of those we help is incredibly rewarding. While communication barriers and travel expenses remain challenges, increased support and more volunteers would allow us to expand our impact."

A Commitment to Service

"Fire brigade volunteering has always been a meaningful way for me to give back to the community," shared Ruben Cainglet Jr. "I have been fascinated by fire trucks and firefighters since childhood, which inspired me to become a fire volunteer for OIC."

The training was rigorous, with challenges like handling fire hoses and managing people in emergencies. "Staying composed while giving clear instructions was difficult. I also felt that rope training needed more time since real-life application differs from demonstrations. Additional training would better prepare volunteers."

"For me, volunteering is about helping others, not personal gain. However, receiving an honorarium for the first time was a meaningful recognition of our efforts. Responding to a fire in Bulua, I witnessed firsthand the immense gratitude of those we assisted, an experience that reaffirmed my commitment."

"I encourage others to join the fire volunteer brigade. The experience is fulfilling and significantly helps ease BFP's workload, ensuring quicker emergency responses. My church community instilled in me the value of service, and I believe volunteering is one of the many ways God guides us to serve others with compassion and dedication." In addition to Jairus and Ruben, the OIC Fire Brigade Program includes 25 other committed volunteers, consisting of dedicated employees and members.

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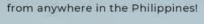
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
